A wonderful end to a very busy term!



















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#### Lateness- Please Note

Starting the school day on time is crucial for your child's day of learning and experiences at school. The start of the day is when teachers discuss the upcoming day's schedule with children, and it is when they come together for morning prayers. When your child is late for school, it is likely they will find it difficult to settle in and engage with important learning, and their late arrival, even if only a few minutes, can be disruptive for other children. All students are expected to be in the classroom by 8.25 a.m. If they do not catch the bus, we recommend that students arrive at least 5-10 minutes before the bell at 8.25 a.m. to greet their teacher and peers, and to be prepared for learning and interacting with others. We humbly ask for your support to ensure your child has a positive start to their school day.


